

County Employment Data*

The rate of unemployment in Waller County fell one-tenth of a percentage point to 5.4 percent in Augusts, one-half of a percentage point higher than one year earlier. The local rate of unemployment was higher than 4.4 percent at the state and national level. Total covered employment in Waller County was down 254 jobs or 0.9 percent over first quarter 2024. The county has had no distinct trend for first quarter reporting gains and losses since records began back in 2003. Most of the decline was driven by seasonal cutbacks in Trade, Transportation, and Utilities, down 280 jobs or 2.9 percent, and Leisure and Hospitality, down 246 jobs or 14.2 percent. The county added 1,150 jobs over the year with the pace of job growth falling to 4.5 percent, down from 9.0 percent in the previous quarter. Job gains were found in most industry sectors. The largest contributor to growth was Trade, Transportation, and Utilities, up 521 jobs or 5.8 percent, but it should be noted growth in this industry sector is the lowest it has been since third quarter 2021. Other substantial gains were found in Professional and Business Services, up 167 jobs or 12.7 percent, and Manufacturing, up 155 jobs or 3.5 percent. The only substantial decline was in Other Services, down 54 jobs or 12.6 percent. Additional details can be found pages 2 through 7.

Employment is the estimate of employment based upon the sample, not the sample employment. Wages for the OES survey are straight-time, gross pay, exclusive of premium pay. Base rate, cost-of-living allowances, guaranteed pay, hazardous-duty pay, incentive pay including commissions and production bonuses, tips, and on-call pay are included. Excluded are back pay, jury duty pay, overtime pay, severance pay, shift differentials, nonproduction bonuses, employer cost of supplementary benefits, and tuition reimbursements. **The Gulf Coast Region is defined as Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Walker, Waller, and Wharbon Counties.
